KEYNOTE PRESENTER: Susan Ifill, Chief Executive Officer, Neighborhood Housing Services of NYC





In addition to her role as CEO, Susan M. Ifill also holds the role of Chief Operating & Financial Officer for Neighborhood Housing Services of New York City and has been with NHSNYC since 2010. Prior to joining NHSNYC, Susan served as Interim Finance Manager for Women's Environment and Development Organization (WEDO). Susan the Senior Vice President and Chief Retail was Officer for Carver Federal Savings Bank in New York, and before Carver, SVP and Premier Banking Market Manager at Bank of America. In her last role at BofA, she led a group of Client Managers in the Premier Banking & Investment Division, responsible for the growth of a \$3 billion portfolio and new client acquisition for Hudson & Essex County in New Jersey. After 30 years of service, Susan retired from banking. Susan has served on numerous not for profit boards over the years and currently serves as the Chair of the Board of Trustees for Cambridge College, member of the Greater Boston Food Bank Emeriti Board, and member of the MPA Program Advisory Board at Kean University. She volunteers as a judge for the National Junior League's Annual Leadership & Vision Award, and is a session leader on board governance for the NYJL Non-Profit Boards Clearinghouse. Susan completed her undergraduate work at UMass Dartmouth and received her Master of Management certification in Negotiation and Conflict and

from Cambridge College. Susan is a member of Sigma Beta Delta honorary society, and is a certified Six Sigma Green Belt.

Allie Chang Ray is the immediate past president of the Junior League of St. Louis and has nearly 25 years of experience in public service and the nonprofit sector. Having served as a past nonprofit executive director and development director for a child welfare organization that utilizes volunteers as their frontline workers for 13 years, Allie is experienced with governance and leadership issues, as well as volunteer and donor engagement practices. In 2014, Allie joined the staff of Deaconess Foundation as Vice President of Programs. In that role, she oversaw the Deaconess Impact Partnership, a four-year organizational capacity building program for child-serving agencies that centered around their growth and sustainability for impact. At the beginning of this year, Allie returned to her consultative practice that serves the philanthropic and nonprofit agency sectors. In January, she received the Emerging Leader in Philanthropy Award from Gateway Center for Giving and was appointed as a Commissioner by Missouri Governor Nixon to the Child Abuse & Neglect Review Board. She also serves as an adjunct faculty member at Washington University in St. Louis' Brown School of Social Work.

#### PANELIST: Ashley Crawford, Vice President, Corporate Partnerships, Covenant House NY





Ashley Crawford currently serves as the Vice President for Corporate Partnerships at Covenant House, charged with developing and leading Covenant House International's corporate engagement strategies to help improve the lives of homeless young people. Prior to this role, one of Ashley's highlights at Covenant House was working with her amazing team to revolutionize young professional engagement, increasing millennial support for helping youth homelessness by 1,200% within two years. Prior to Covenant House, she served two years with City Year New York, where she worked with a team of peers to develop and implement a service learning and leadership development program for middle school students in Long Island City, Queens. Ashley holds a BA in Human Resource Management from Michigan State University and a MPA in Public and Non Profit Management and Policy from NYU Wagner. Lord joined World Youth Alliance in 2011 and became a full-time staff member in January 2014 as Regional Director for the Asia Pacific region. After a year, Lord was recognized by the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Youth Leaders Association with the Gawad ASEANO Award for his praiseworthy efforts in youth development in Southeast Asia. Charlotte brings more than 25 years of experience in various facets of diversity and inclusion, HR and corporate social responsibility management as the Executive Director, of the PwC Charitable Foundation. Throughout her 15 year tenure at PwC, she has held various leadership positions, most recently as Director and Employee Engagement leader on the firm's Corporate Responsibility team. In this role, she was responsible for identifying and implementing employee engagement strategies, national non-profit partnerships, scalable programming components and skills-based volunteer opportunities in support of the firm's Earn Your Future (EYF) commitment, a five year, \$160 million dollar investment supporting youth education with an emphasis on improving the financial competency of American youth. Prior, Coker Gibson, under PwC's National Office of Diversity, led its Impact Program – a national early minority talent development program. With a career spanning almost 30 years, Bill began his career at Merrill Lynch in 1986. #### PANELIST: Vijaya Thakur, Founder and Executive Director, Resolve Network





Vijaya P. Thakur is the Founder and Executive Director of Resolve Network, a grassroots peacebuilding organization in Eastern Congo. In her previous capacities as Policy Director for Friends of the Congo, Policy Associate for Genocide Watch, and Policy Associate for the Genocide Intervention Network, Vijaya focused on US Foreign Policy on genocide prevention and intervention. Vijaya has also worked on risk assessment and early warning mechanisms for genocide, post-conflict transitional justice, post-conflict reconstruction, and mainstreaming women's empowerment as part of peacebuilding. Upon concluding program evaluations of United Nations and other projects in Eastern Congo, Vijaya decided to adopt a community-based, micro-to-macro approach to peacebuilding in her own work, leading her to found Resolve Network in 2009. Vijaya currently resides in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, where she is expanding Resolve's programs to the most conflict-affected communities in Eastern Congo.

#### PANELIST: Triada Stampas, Vice President for Research & Public Affairs, Food Bank for NYC



As Vice President for Research and Public Affairs, Triada Stampas leads Food Bank For New York City's efforts in research and evaluation, policy advocacy, and communications. Ms. Stampas previously served as Senior Director of Government Relations at Food Bank for more than five years, successfully advocating for new Federal, State and City funding for anti-hunger initiatives, including leading the statewide campaign that restored \$30 million in dedicated funding for emergency food in the State budget. Prior to joining Food Bank, Ms. Stampas served as Director of the New York City Council's Investigations Division, where she conducted primary research and evaluation of City policies and programs, leading to oversight hearings and the adoption of new local laws. Earlier, she served as Chief of Staff to former Council Member Eric Gioia. A Queens native, Ms. Stampas holds a Bachelor's degree from Harvard University and a Master's degree in public administration from Columbia University. She currently serves on advisory committees for national anti-hunger organizations Feeding America and the Food Research & Action Center (FRAC).
