The Community Improvement Project Kicks Off Its Fifth Year

he Community Improvement Project (CIP) committee is excited to announce its partnership with Harbor Science & Arts for the 2016-2017 NYJL volunteer year. Harbor Science & Arts, a charter school, opened in 2000, and is located in East Harlem. It serves approximately 255 students across grades K-8. CIP will collaborate with the school staff and a team of designers and contractors to renovate the middle school science lab that focuses on Earth and Physical Sciences.

In its fifth year, the CIP committee continues to team with non-profit organizations in need of improvements and renovations to their Manhattan-based facilities in order to help those organizations further fulfill their mission to the NYC community. The RFP process kicked off in early May and a number of worthy organizations submitted applications for consideration. As part of the RFP process, a select NYJL taskforce was assembled to review all the applications and select three finalists. The outgoing CIP co-chairs, Liz Fabsits and Stephanie Ellison, and incoming co-chairs, Terry Pope and Caroline Harrison, (continued on page 8)

Dear Volunteers,

Over the past few months, I had the pleasure to speak with many of you and hear what makes the New York Junior League so special to each of you. Among the many, many reasons that our volunteers choose to devote their time and talents to the NYJL are: "it allows me to give directly back to my community while honing new professional and leadership skills," "the feeling that at any moment the volunteer work I do could be contributing

to helping a New Yorker in need to achieve their dreams," "the opportunity to make new and lasting friendships," and "it gives me a chance to make the world a better place."

In the fall, you each will be asked to take our Organizational Survey focusing on our active volunteers and the Sustainer Survey focusing on our sustainer volunteers. Stanley Isaacs Showcases Its Many Talents

Since 2009, the NYJL has partnered with the Stanley M. Isaacs Neighborhood Center bringing arts education to children in low-income housing in Yorkville and East Harlem. This committee, known as Stanley the students were able to experience her work known as nature-based art. The students finished the year with an art show at the school which displayed the children's work.

Beacon to Broadway kept busy this year, starting off with a guest visit from actor/writer Jeremy Rishe who can be seen in a multitude of TV series and commercials including Blue Bloods, Law & Order: SVU, The Good Wife, and

Isaacs Performing Arts, consists of Artistic Journeys (ages 7-9) and Beacon to Broadway (ages 10-13) who meet every Wednesday evening during the school year at PS 198.

This past year, Artistic Journeys worked on many projects, such as using tissue paper flowers as the inspiration for still life drawings, watercolors to practice ideas of impressionism and sculpting with child-friendly clay to explore Renaissance sculpture. They even had a visit from the Head of European Ceramics and Glass at Christie's to introduce the students to the concept of Decorative Arts, specifically Porcelain. Additional guest speakers included Cory Sedlmeier from Marvel Comics and teaching artist Andrea Burgay who together, taught a lesson on comic book art.

Artistic Journeys also went on field trips including a walk to The Craft Studio to learn about Jackson Pollock and create their own drip and splatter paintings on canvas. They visited the Bronx Museum of the Arts opening reception for Michelle Stuart's Theater of Memory: Photographic Works and

H&R Block. Mr. Rishe spoke to the students about his career as an actor, performed a monologue of his own and discussed script reading with them prior to the students working and performing monologues selected for each of them.

Along with learning about improvisation, reading scripts, and auditioning, they learned about special effects

makeup and how to tie a bowtie and neck tie in their costumes lesson. The students also took in two shows this year: Christmas Spectacular Starring the Radio City Rockettes and the Broadway production School of Rock where they were fortunate to attend a private meet and greet with two young stars from the show. After rehearsing for over 4 months, the students and volunteers ended the year with a spectacular production of Annie Kids.

First Lady Michelle Obama once said "A child's first inspiration through the arts can be a life-changing experience...learning through the arts reinforces critical academic skills in reading, language, arts and math and provides students with the skills to creatively solve problems." Both Artistic Journeys and Beacon to Broadway are anticipating another great year of collaborations with exciting guest speakers and field trips to museums and shows. Beacon to Broadway's next production will be Peter Pan Kids in the Spring of 2017.

PIP Unveils 25th Annual Project

on Sunday, May 22, the Playground Improvement Project (PIP) committee returned its 25th annual project, a newly restored Marcus Garvey Park, to the Harlem community.

Surrounded by newly created flower beds and freshly painted playgrounds, NYJL President Stacey Lawrence Lee led the ceremony. Stacey opened the day with remarks centered around the 25-year partnership between the New York Junior League and the New York City Department of Parks and Recreation. Stacey's remarks were followed by distinguished speakers Mitchell Silver, Commissioner of the New York City Parks and Recreation; Diane Collier, Chair of Community Board #11 of Manhattan; and Connie Lee, President of the Marcus Garvey Park Alliance. Nicole Ferrin, NYJL Culture and the Arts Council Head, led the cutting of the ribbon to symbolize the return of the park to the community. Following the ceremony, the PIP committee had arranged family friendly activities and a performance by Band Seed for community members to enjoy. A great time was had by all!

Over five weekends this spring, the PIP committee worked to revitalize Marcus Garvey Park with the help of nearly 1,000 volunteers, including New York City Department of Parks and Recreation employees, sponsor Village Obstetrics, service organizations, neighborhood residents, and children. Volunteers made a big impact on this well-loved park by cleaning, painting, gardening and landscaping the playground and park area. The NYJL and PIP also donated supplies needed to completely refurbish the park's basketball courts and barbeque areas, as well as BigBelly Solar units. These state of the art, solar panel trash receptacles will help to minimize staff hours, keep litter and pests at a minimum and increase the overall cleanliness in the park.

The NYJL and the PIP committee look forward to returning to Marcus Garvey Park in the fall to complete touch-up work – and continuing their work with their 26th project next spring!

New View: Building Libraries that Last

he New View committee, which works with Good Shepherd Services (GSS), expanded its presence in 2014 to the East 17th Street GSS location. There, volunteers have worked with young adults transitioning out of the foster care system, including a group of teenage girls from East New York living in a non-secure placement detention center. While these girls were no strangers to delinquency issues, their struggles appeared more elementary to volunteer Leigh Held. The Center's learning specialist confirmed that most of the 15-18 year old girls read somewhere between a 4th and 9th grade reading level (appropriate for ages 9-14).

The Department of Justice confirms that 85% of all juveniles who interface with the justice system are functionally illiterate and over 70% of inmates in America's prisons cannot read above a 4th grade level. In response to these statistics, the committee launched a library project to give these youth access to books.

In total, 175 titles were purchased, catalogued, and transported to three GSS locations where they were prominently displayed to encourage use. Residents and social workers alike have been delighted with the donations and many residents commented that they had not heard of most of these titles and have enjoyed checking out their first books. NYJL volunteers have now begun work on three additional library locations. New View and fellow committee Reading Rangers, which targets younger children, encourage and welcome any and all book donations to maintain and grow the libraries.

"The hope of every NYJL installed library is that it inspires a love of reading," says Held, who will be spearheading the project with Reading Rangers this coming volunteer year.

NPBC Announces Accelerated Course

n the heels of two successful spring trainings, The Nonprofit Boards Clearinghouse committee is excited to announce this year's fall accelerated nonprofit course. Over two days, participants will gain competence and confidence in board leadership skills through workshops on topics that include board roles and responsibilities, monitoring financial policies, understanding legal responsibilities of board members, and developing strategic plans.

The course includes a Q&A session with current nonprofit executive directors and a networking event with members from NPBC's extensive roster of nonprofit organizations in the New York City area. Each course participant is assigned an advisor to facilitate a potential board placement.

Diann Rhode, former NYJL president, former AJLI Board Member and NPBC course presenter says, "The NYJL Nonprofit Clearinghouse course is unique as it trains present and potential board members to understand their duties, gain insight into the workings of a nonprofit and help find pathways to advancing the organization's mission," noting that nonprofit organizations with whom NPBC works understand that "to have trained board members is a gift to a nonprofit and to making the New York City community stronger."

The NPBC committee's two-day accelerated course will be held at the NYJL on Saturday, October 29 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Wednesday, November 2 from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. The course is \$325 for NYJL volunteers and \$375 for the general public. Please visit nyjl.org for more information.

Introducing Four New Committees for 2016-2017

The NYJL is excited to introduce four new committees for the 2016-2017 volunteer year: Building Blocks, GOAL, LIFT, and Passport to the World.

Building Blocks is a new NYJL committee focused on interactive play with moms and babies (ages six months to four years). The committee will provide free "Mommy and Me" classes to an underserved community who would not normally be able to afford it. NYJL volunteers will attend with their own children, with the added bonus of engaging new mothers in this busy time of their life. Building Blocks will partner with longtime NYJL community partner The Single Parent Resource Center, Inc.

Building Blocks will meet every other week with approximately eight SPRC mothers and their babies. Activities for consideration are yoga, music, and animated story time. The bi-weekly Saturday meetings will be composed of one hour of "structured" class time and/or play with a professional leading the session followed by 30 minutes of networking/socialization with the mothers.

Girls Opportunity Advancement and Leadership (GOAL) is excited to get started this Fall. GOAL is a partnership with Union Settlement and is focused on encouraging at-risk young women (ages II to I5) to pursue higher education and delay pregnancy. Monthly workshops will cover topics such as leadership, team building, goal setting, careers, dressing for different situations, healthy relationships, bullying reduction, understanding your body, and self-care. Arts and/or hands on activities (such as skits, visual arts, and songs) incorporating the topic of the day will be incorporated into the session. The committee's ultimate GOAL is to discourage teenage pregnancy and encourage college and vocational education.

Lead, Inspire, Focus, and Thrive (LIFT) will work with 12 to 18 year-old at-risk teens to provide youth development workshops and mentorship. Workshops will be held at Leake & Watts, a new community partner to the NYJL. Leake & Watts is a not-for-profit agency committed to addressing a myriad of challenges that confront individuals and families dealing with poverty, disabilities, and a lack of access to education and basic services.

LIFT will work with youth in the Family Stabilization Services Program, which is dedicated to strengthening and preserving families. During the bi-weekly two-hour workshops, volunteers will be administering lesson plans and activities including, but not limited to, healthy living, job skills training, community involvement and mindfulness. The main goal for the committee is to help the youth discover their strengths and achieve their full potential through mentorship.

Finally, **Passport to the World** will partner with Mentoring USA and Stanley Isaacs Community Center to mentor fourth and fifth graders while introducing global lessons to produce overall growth and development.

The program is based on workshops in which committee members pair with program participants at a one to one ratio held at the Stanley Isaac Community Center in Harlem. The program will launch its first year with 10 children. Each module will include an introduction to a different culture with individual sessions focusing on activities including drama, storytelling, visual arts, and music, and include field trips and outings to the many cultural institutions available around Manhattan.
