Healthy Beginnings Help Create Healthy Futures

his fall, the Healthy Beginnings committee transitioned to a new community partner, the Andrew Glover Youth Program (AGYP). AGYP's mission is to prevent young people from committing crimes and entering the prison system. Their efforts address a problem with significant societal implications and costs; according to the Mayor's 2012 Management Report, more than 4,000 New Yorkers under age 16 were admitted to detention at a cost of \$634 per day per youth. Compounding the magnitude of these statistics, spending time in juvenile detention seems to increase the likelihood of future incarceration: the recidivism rate for youth in New York State stands at 80%.

To meet this enormous challenge, AGYP runs programs providing daily supervision for first-time juvenile offenders, offering an alternative to the prison system. Programs include engagement with the court process, counseling, and after-school educational and recreational programs, creating communities to support participants as they work to build better futures. And the approach is highly successful: 94% of AGYP's graduates stay out of prison.

The NYJL contributes to AGYP programming through on-site workshops at their Lower East Side location. Healthy Beginnings organizes activities to build confidence, such as writing letters to their future selves, creating posters illustrating personalities and goals, and practicing job interview scenarios. Our committee tailors these activities to complement existing AGYP projects. "Our committee members walk away from each session feeling inspired by the work AGYP is doing," said co-chair Kristen Oliver, "but daunted by the scale of the challenge that the program is addressing. We are happy to be supporting such an impactful organization."

• Strategic Priority II: Technology and Information

By 2018, the NYJL will upgrade its technology and will be able to capture and analyze comprehensive, accurate data regarding the operations of the organization, including membership, finances, fundraising and training, in order to support effective decision making and management of the organization.

• Strategic Priority III: Volunteer Power and Training

By 2018, the NYJL will offer its volunteers a wide range of training and other opportunities to develop and enhance their leadership skills, and will have a robust pipeline of interested and capable volunteers at all levels of the organization who are trained and prepared for leadership roles.

• Strategic Priority IV: External Reputation and Visibility

By 2018, the NYJL will enhance its reputation and increase its visibility with key external stakeholders, (e.g. potential volunteers, community partners and donors), and communicate more effectively what the purpose of the organization is, what it does, and what it seeks to achieve.

• Strategic Priority V: Financial Strength and Sustainability

By 2018, the NYJL will expand and diversify its revenue sources in order to ensure its financial health and sustainability.

These priorities were proposed by our Strategic Planning committee who were guided by our Community Partner and Membership surveys to ensure we reflect the goals and desires of you, our volunteers, and those we serve. The next step is to align these goals with strategies for achieving them. New Beginnings Committee Begins Work at WPA's Hopper Home

early all of us are aware of the pop-culture phenomenon Orange is the New Black, a Netflix series that combines poignant and humorous depictions of female friendship with the harsh realities of life as an incarcerated woman. What you may not know is that the NYIL has a storied history of improving the lives of women who are moving forward postincarceration. The NYIL's New Beginnings committee is in its second year with community partner Women's Prison Association. While the partnership between

New Beginnings and the WPA is a fairly recent one, NYJL volunteers have long worked with the organization through previous committees. In fact, the WPA is one of the NYJL's oldest community partners, and NYJL Sustainer Tina Daniels currently

serves as the President of the Board of the WPA. Serving alongside Tina as a Vice President of the Board is Piper Kerman, author of the memoir on which the Netflix series is based and a veteran of the women's prison system. This fall, New Beginnings began work with women living at Hopper Home in the East Village. Hopper Home is the historic headquarters of the Women's Prison Association, which was established in 1845. Following a number of upgrades and city certifications, Hopper Home became a fully

New Beginnings additionally incorporates one-on-one

operational homeless shelter in August of this year.

New Beginnings is part of the Adult Education and Mentoring Council. Following the closure of the Bayview Correctional Facility, New Beginnings was established to continue to help the population of women who have served time in jail as they try to get back on their feet following incarceration.

"The work New Beginnings does with WPA continues the long history the NYJL has had with New York's population of incarcerated women," said New Beginnings co-chair Charlene Chuang. "This partnership believes in providing these women not only with the tools necessary to be self sufficient and financially stable, but also with the confidence and resources of peers (both NYJL volunteers and women living at Hopper Home) to be happy and authentic women."
